The Calgary Student Run Clinic

The Calgary Student Run Clinic (SRC) operates out of the downtown Mustard Seed Wellness Centre, with the main focus on providing accessible health services for the city's underserved. The SRC is a true team effort, with University of Calgary Cumming School of Medicine students working on the executive team and on the front lines as student clinicians.

The clinic is guided by family physicians and the leadership team at the Mustard Seed collaborating with students from various health disciplines such as counselling and occupational therapy. The SRC also runs health promotion workshops out of the Calgary Dream Centre and the Mustard Seed, hosts annual fundraisers (the Cumming School of Medicine's Rich Man Poor Man banquet) and organizes community outreach events (Women's Empowerment Night).

The SRC team continues to adapt, collaborate and advocate for the clinic's clientele during the pandemic.

An exciting aspect of the SRC is the limitless potential the clinic has to grow and to help Calgary's underserved population. Even though this year's students met the many challenges, Olivia, Tess and the rest of the team are excited to welcome the incoming Class of 2023.
